"Sure! Please make sure that the tiger is bigger and better than the one from yesterday," his friend says.

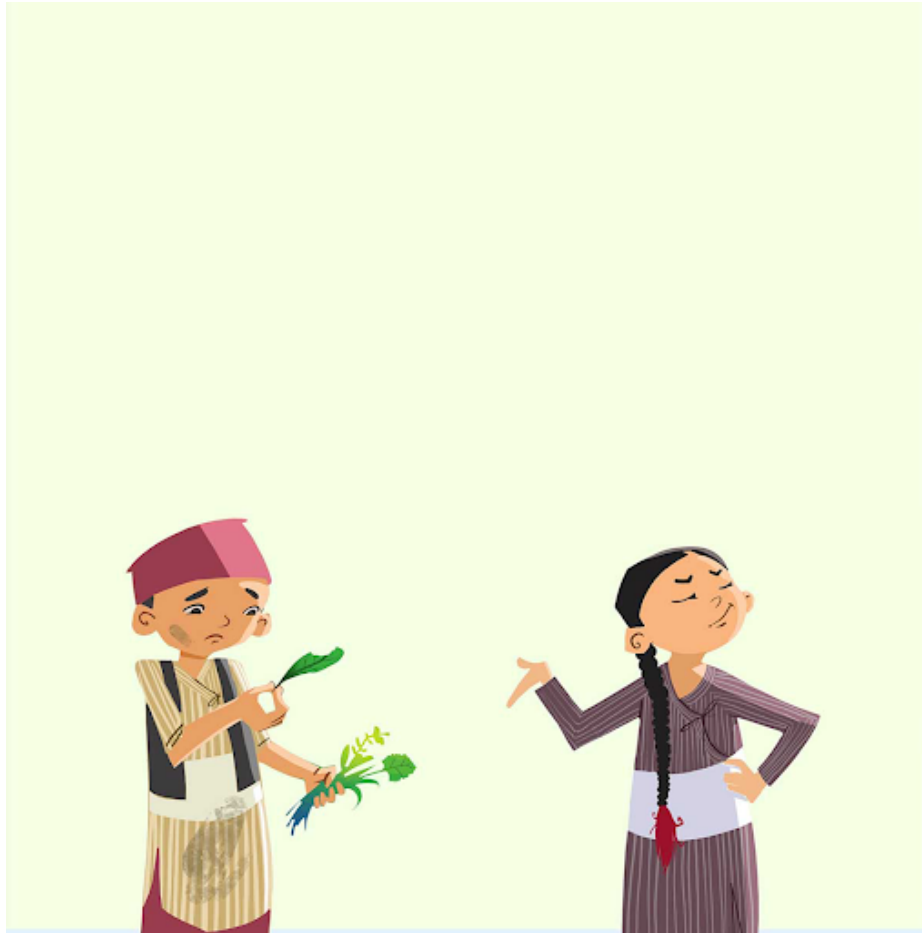

He then turned to the statue and said, "Oh tiger! Will you please look after our sheep?"



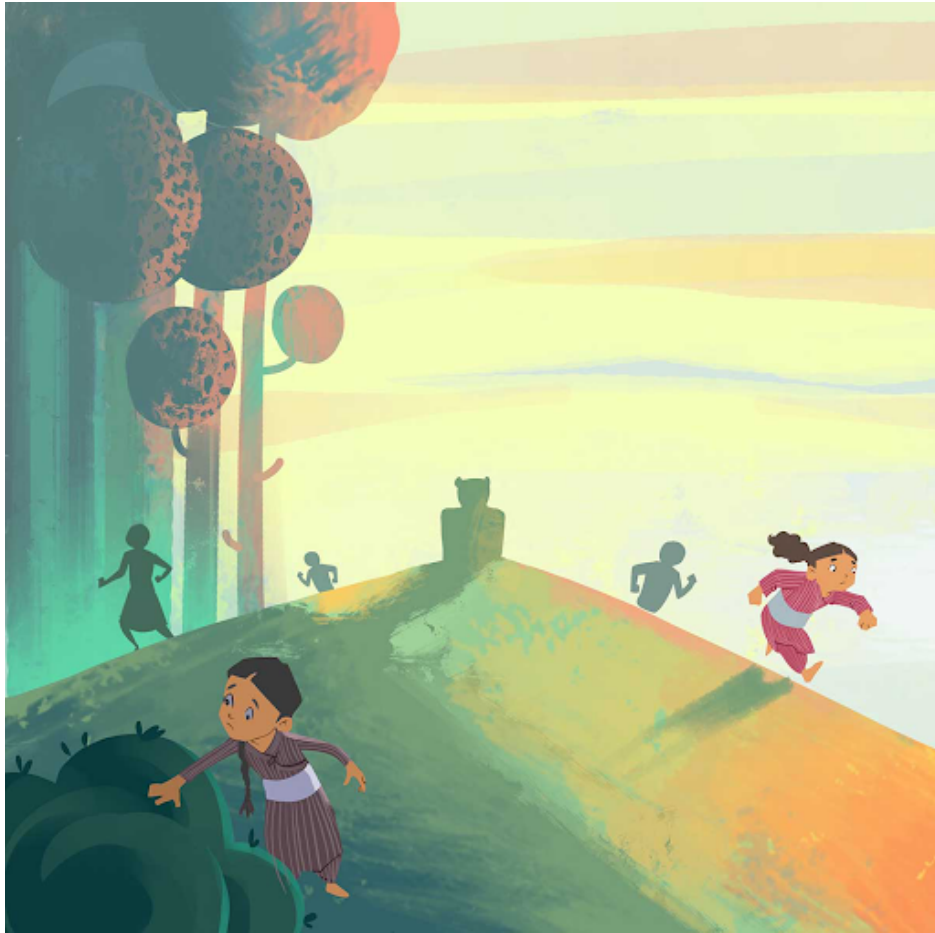
All the children go to the neighboring forest to look for leaves.
